Joshua 1 and 2

"I'm sorry, Jeremy. I know your God is powerful. I guess I don't know very much about Him," said Lucas.

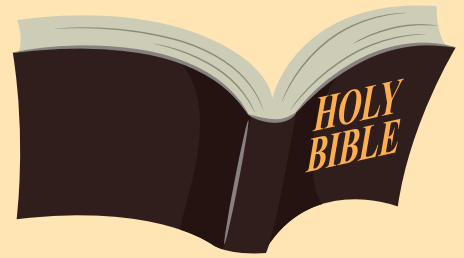

Rahab Reminder

Rahab knew doctrinal truths about God even though she was not a Hebrew and did not have Scriptures to read. By observation she learned God is the one true God, He is mighty and powerful, and He is to be trusted. That was enough for her to have faith in Him. She joined the Israelites and appears in the lineage of Christ.

The spies had to lower themselves hand over hand down the red cord. Make a reminder of this event. Unfold a red plastic table cloth and gather it together vertically, tying it at intervals with red yard. Have your child trace his or her hand on skin-toned construction paper five times—3 left hands, 2 right hands. Cut out the hands. Print the following word or phrase on each hand: (left hand 1) Rahab, (right hand 2) Asked for, (left hand 3) Help, (right hand 4) And, (left hand 5) Believed God. Have your child use a crayon or marker to trace over the capital letters that spell RAHAB on each hand. Use double-sided tape to put the hands on the red cord in order from the top down as a reminder to have faith in God.



Growing at Home

This curriculum is based on the truth that the Bible is the inspired Word of God and that it is the only standard for our faith and practice. Therefore, it is important to communicate to pre-primary children important truths about the Bible.

Keep these truths in mind as you teach your child God's Word.

- God is real, and the Bible is a book of His written words.
- The Bible is perfect and never changes.
- God wants us to listen to His Word and worship and trust Him alone.
- God wants us to learn and obey His Word.
- We must handle our Bibles carefully.



Measurables

Look for these indications that your child understands God is the only One worthy of our faith.

1. My child knows God is a real, living Person.
2. My child understands God is over Heaven and earth.
3. My child understands Rahab put her trust in the One true God, not in the spies or the red cord.
4. My child can verbalize Who God is and why we should believe in Him.
