

The Big Question

Why does the Bible say God has hands?

Your memory verse for this week says the “hand” of the Lord is mighty (Joshua 4:24). From the verse, you might conclude God has actual hands. Perhaps you might imagine Him reaching down to earth to pat you on the back or even thump you on the head for doing something wrong. Other verses in the Bible say God has an arm (Exodus 6:6), eyes (Amos 9:3), ears (Daniel 9:18), and feet (Genesis 3:8). Some verses say God takes actions normally associated with our human bodies. Isaiah 7:18 says God whistles, and Psalm 2:4 says He laughs. You probably have never thought of God whistling or laughing!

So, what should we make of all the references to God’s “body” since the Bible is clear God the Father is a spirit and has no body (John 4:24). Paul even wrote in 1 Timothy 1:17 that God is invisible, meaning He doesn’t have a physical body at all.

Remember, the Bible is literature. As such, it uses figures of speech to make God’s truth come to life. In fact, there are around two hundred different kinds of figures of speech used in the Bible. Anthropomorphism is the name of the figure of speech that gives human qualities to God. Anthropomorphisms help us understand God better by giving us a picture of His actions to form in our minds as we are reading the Bible. The Bible says God has a hand so we might better understand God’s character and ways.

Jesus, unlike God the Father, took on a human body when He came to earth. Jesus’ physical body is real. When He died on the cross, His human body actually died. And when He rose from the dead, it was His human body that came back to life, though it was raised perfect and glorified. Jesus will keep His human body forever. That means you can give Him a hug when you see Him in Heaven!



Amazing Facts

God’s Fingerprints on Your Fingerprints

Fingerprints come in three basic patterns: loop, whorl, and arch. Look at your fingers to see what basic pattern you have. See the illustrations in the box to the right.

No two fingerprints are alike. Even identical twins have different fingerprints. Why is that? Fingerprints are in part shaped by the baby’s environment as it is growing in his mother’s womb. As the baby’s skin is forming, he touches things and causes stress or pulling on the skin. That stress causes the ridges to form what becomes the foundation for his fingerprints. No two babies experience the same stress on their fingertips as they are developing.

Of course, God is responsible for a baby’s development. Ultimately, your fingerprints were determined by God before the world even began. That means God’s mighty hands shaped the tiny ridges on your fingers that are unique to you. You could say that God’s “fingerprints” are all over your fingerprints!

1. How else are God’s “fingerprints” all over your life?
2. When you serve God, expect His mighty hands to help you. And then thank Him for His mighty help!
