The Big Question

How can God have no beginning?

The truth that God had no beginning makes us scratch our heads. That's because we exist in time, meaning our lives have a beginning, middle, and end. We have no frame of reference for imagining an eternal existence. It's like trying to imagine a brand new color. We would have a hard time seeing the color in our minds because it is not like any color we have seen before. Similarly, we can't comprehend an eternal existence because it runs counter to our thinking.

God created time (Genesis 1:3–5), meaning He by necessity exists outside of time and is unbound by it. Think of a painter. He has to be outside of his canvass while painting his picture. And so it is with God and time.

The Bible teaches that God's perspective on time is different than our perspective. A thousand years is an incredibly long time to us, but to God it is like a day when compared to eternity (Ps. 90:4). Peter added that a day to God is like a thousand years (2 Pet. 3:8). The point is that God has unlimited time and is not constrained by it. He is above time and works His eternal plan as He sees fit.

> We must accept that God is eternal and still working out His plan. He will yet fulfill all His promises no matter how many thousands of years go by.

Case in Point

Now and Eternity

Brent has been to Sunday School nearly every Sunday for as long as he can remem-

ber. He doesn't mind church, but he doesn't see the need to be so worried about trying to obey God every moment of every day. Sometimes he likes to hang with his friends and just be a regular guy instead of a Christian. He doesn't guard what he says or watches. He joins whatever his friends are doing or saying.


"I know God understands," Brent thinks. "He knows I'm saved and that I have been good about going to church. Certainly He doesn't care too much about what I do with my friends. I'm just a six grader after all. I don't see how doing what I want to do could ever affect the future. I'll be in Heaven after I die. I know God won't kick me out of Heaven for anything I do or say on earth."
